Early European methods were brought to the newly formed America, and through the work of Thomas Hopkins Gallaudet, the American School for the Deaf was created in 1817. Similar schools emerged across the country, including a school founded by Alexander Graham Bell who adamantly believed that deaf individuals could and should be taught to speak.
